



# TRACKING CRIME IN NYC PARKS

## Quarterly Data on Crime in Parks

Prior to April 2006, the New York City Police Department (NYPD) did not specifically track crimes occurring on city parkland.\* Following extensive advocacy efforts by New Yorkers for Parks and other groups, Local Law 114 was passed requiring the NYPD to track crime in the City's 20 largest parks. In 2008, the program was expanded to 30 parks. New Yorkers for Parks continues to advocate for the tracking of crime in all parks throughout the city.

\*The lone exception is Central Park, where crime has been tracked by the Central Park Police Precinct for decades.

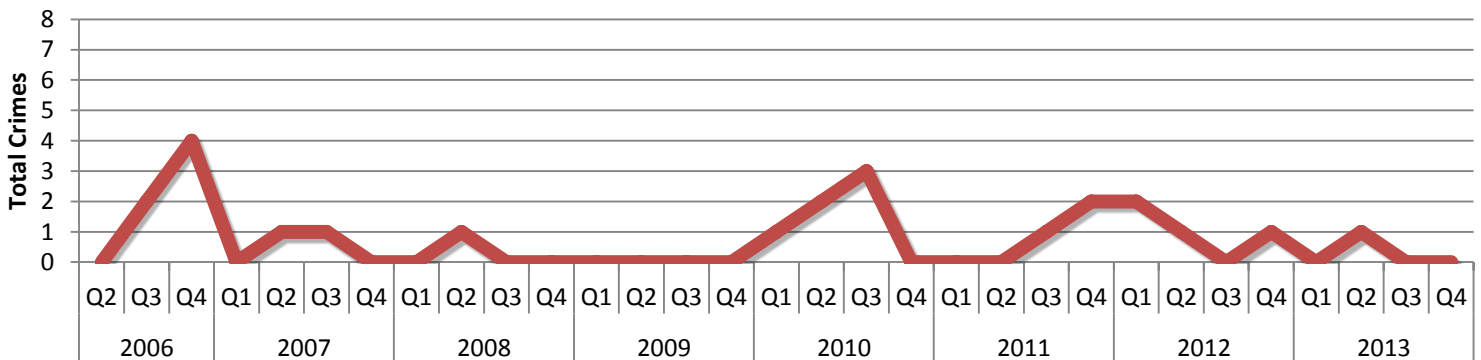
